Hello fellow Sailors,

As you become a sailor you become aware that there is always something new to learn every time you go out. This year seemed especially educational as I spent time with the SunFish fleet, the WhiteSail Fleet and this past weekend with a couple of Webelos scouts working on the Aquanaut Adventure. In all of these activities I played student and teacher as I learned each boat I crewed on and shared some experience with seasoned as well as brand new sailors.

The Sunfish fleet has been a great success! Researching, rigging, fixing and sailing has provided lots of opportunity to learn more about these boats. For next year, we plan to move the rack to a more permanent location and build a more accessible launching system. We still have a couple of weekends this year to sail these boats before covering them up for the winter.

I crewed for most of the WhiteSail races this year and ended up on a different boat every week. I learned a lot about each boat and helped tune and adjust each boat to perform a little bit better. I also shared some of my starting strategies to cross the line as close to the gun as possible. The tips must have helped, as for the final WhiteSail Regatta, there was more close racing competition between all of boats than we have ever seen in past years.

This past weekend we hosted a couple of Webelos Scouts to go sailing and work on their Aquanauts Adventure. We started with some training on shore covering swimming

safety, boating safety and rescue strategy. We followed that with a talk from Ken, who was a Scout leader and a life guard on certification training and testing. We then went out on Tom Malone's Catalina 350 (Argo) to introduce the guests to sailing and practice manover-board drills. With me at the wheel, Jim and Ken trimming and the scouts on lookout and retrieval, we managed to recover the "man" (a.k.a fender) on the fourth try. We spent a couple of hours on



the water and two of the guests, who had never sailed before, were taking it all in. A great time was had by all, and they accomplished 4 of the required 6 activities toward completing their adventure.

There are still a few more weeks of sailing and learning this year, and I look forward to more learning opportunities next year. I encourage you all to try crewing on different boats. I know you will learn from it, and you may be able apply some of that knowledge to your own boat. I hope to see you out on the water,

# From the Race Captain

We have completed both the White Sail and Open Fleet seasons since the last issue of the Docklines. We also conducted the White Sail Regatta and the Commodore's Cup. The weather continued to be a problem for our weeknight races with either no wind or thunderstorms ensuing. The White Sail boats were able to sail 2 more races making the total for the year 10. The Open Fleet managed only one more race finishing the season with 17.

races were sailed so a boat's season score is the total of its 12 best places. Brian Plank and crew on Inside Edge finished convincingly in first place. This was the 7th year in a row with Inside Edge leading the fleet.

The weekend of September 7th & 8th was a busy time for the racing fleets with very favorable conditions for the two events. Wind speeds ranged from 10-15 knots on Saturday for the five boats vying for top honors in the White Sail regatta. Three

races were contested with a different course for each. Ron and Karen Plank finished in first place tallying 2 bullets. Morning Glory and Adagio finished with the same total score. That tie was broken by Morning Glory with

the best finish between the two boats in the 3 races. Complete results are shown in the third chart.

Sunday saw a bit less velocity in the wind, but it remained above 5 knots for the duration of the Commodore's Cup. There were 10 competing boats with the crews sailing a 5-mile course involving 2 laps out to buoy 109 and back. Those results are shown in the fourth chart to the right.

It hardly seems possible but all that remains of the 2019 racing season are 4 Frostbite Series races, one has already happened. The season always seems so long in May looking forward, but it seems to

"sail" by quickly. So, this is your last chance until next May. Get out and get those last minutes on the water. Frostbite races are proceeded by a skippers meeting taking place at 14.00.
